
Big Ol' Fish



A Big Deal with Very Little Fanfare

During its first 12 years of operation, Discovery Living operated under a set of state guidelines that were essentially modified nursing home regulations. The homes we operated were known as “Residential Care Facilities for the Mentally Retarded” or RCF-MR. While the state regulated us and set tight payment limits, they pushed 90% of the funding responsibility for these services to the 99 counties and consumers. Those who lived in our group homes paid nearly all of their Social Security benefits each month toward room and board expenses. As little as \$25 was left over for clothing, entertainment, and personal spending. As a result, Discovery Living was barely breaking even each year and the consumers lived on extremely tight budgets too. But for the state it was a mighty good deal: control and regulate the program--but pay very little to operate it.

The situation in many other parts of the nation was much different. Numerous states had shifted their funding to a federal Medicaid program known as “[Home and Community-Based Services](#)” (HCBS). These states reported more dollars being available to pay staff better wages, more flexibility in service delivery, innovative ideas being tried to meet unmet needs, the downsizing of homes to just 4-5 people per location, and much improved community integration in regular neighborhoods. All of those ideas sounded good to us.

Unfortunately, the powers that be resisted legislative overtures toward Medicaid funding for these community-based services. Let other states do it--but Iowa was not interested. Iowa DHS dug its heels in and wanted no part of HCBS for a number of years.

But finally, in the early 1990s a breakthrough occurred. Iowa could no longer allow millions of federal dollars to pass them by. A couple from Colorado, Bill & Jan Gorman, were hired at the central office of DHS in Des Moines. They had extensive experience with HCBS and knew what it would take to bring the program to Iowa. After years of waiting, Iowa became one of the last states to join the HCBS program.


So what did it all mean for Discovery Living when we began the shift to HCBS in 1994? The biggest change was that 8-bed size group homes were reduced to 4 persons per home. We opened new locations, often in rental properties, and hired more staff to cover our expanded number of homes. Eventually, we bought more and more homes in across Cedar Rapids, Marion, and Hiawatha. The reaction by consumers and parents was favorable. And generally, neighbors were accepting too.

The shift also meant we had to comply with federal, not state, regulations. But the days of modified nursing home regulations were in the past. More careful documentation was required showing how we were spending federal tax dollars. One big plus was that we could pay our direct-support employees better wages. This improved staff morale and job retention. That was good for everyone--retaining good employees and maintaining high service quality. We expanded supervised apartment living services for a group of consumers who could live more independently. We also began providing in-home support services for families whose son or daughter still lived at home, but wanted to prepare for a future move to a house or apartment.

All of these favorable changes took place with little fanfare. People in the community noticed our expansion and understood that we simply had to address the growing waiting list of people needing our services. Discovery Living also became more fiscally stable under HCBS. No longer were we a hand-to-mouth operation hoping to just survive. Were there bumps in the road? Sure, a few--but not many.

The first transition to HCBS went very well. Let's hope those overseeing the states managed care initiative closely monitor this transition to make it successful too.

Medicaid Modernization Update

Iowa's [Medicaid Modernization](#) Initiative continues to move forward, although there have been a few bumps in the road. Here is where we are today:



On 12/17/15 the [Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services \(CMS\)](#) announced that the state of Iowa was not adequately prepared to implement the transition of Medicaid funded disability and mental health services to a managed care model by 1/1/16. CMS mandated that the implementation start date be pushed back 60 days, to 3/1/16. On 2/23/16, CMS announced that Iowa may proceed with the Medicaid transition, but delayed the start date another 30 days, until 4/1/16.

We at Discovery Living received our approved reimbursement rates, which were effective 12/1/15, from Iowa Medicaid Enterprise Provider Cost Audit. We reached out to the three managed care organizations (MCO's) and requested that they honor our approved reimbursement rates. [AmeriHealth Caritas Iowa, Inc.](#) and [Amerigroup Iowa, Inc.](#) agreed to our request. UnitedHealthcare Plan of the River Valley, Inc (UHC), stated that they will not negotiate provider rates at this time. We are unable to accept reimbursement rates from UHC that are well below our cost of providing the service. As a result of this, we will not be joining the United Health Care provider network. Discovery Living, Inc. is part of the provider network for:

WHERE SHOULD I GO?!
