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An Ounce of (Pandemic) Prevention...

1. Fiber feeds the "good" bacteria in your gut. When

you keep the "good' bacteria happy they will keep the immune system ready when needed. Start each day with a breakfast of unsweetened bran cereal topped with blueberries.

2. Immune cells circulate in the body during exercise so try and work in a brisk walk for 30-60 minutes each day.
